I have annotated two of my games from the tournament. In round 3, I was playing black against Dana Poon from New Mexico. The game lasted only 14 moves, with a quick checkmate for me. I had a pin on the knight to her queen and made good use of it. Dana had a nice pin on my main attacking piece, my knight, and it could have gotten her out of trouble, and put me in trouble.

I qualified for the Rockefeller tournament this year, which was held in Palm Springs, California. I knew it would be a good tournament from the start when I got a little elephant plush from Dewain Barber's travels. The tournament kicked off with a welcome ceremony where we got state flags and participation medallions.

The chess portion kicked off with a decent win against the West Virginia delegate. I was feeling very good! Then I was pitted against the Washington delegate, Yiding Lu, who I managed to hold to a draw.

The next day I played New York delegate Sam Luger and lost. I learned a lot from that game. After that, we went to a book signing by Dewain Barber himself, the organizer of the tournament. I bought his book and he signed it. I then took out two lower-rated opponents, Austin Uezu and Oliver Hsiao, in the fourth and fifth rounds, using aggressivity as a strong suit.

Going into the last round with 3.5 out of 5 , I was feeling like nothing could stop me. Then I had to play John Abraham, the Kentucky delegate that I had played a year ago. I got a decent position out of the opening and got a dominating game. Then he started pressuring on the kingside and, despite a material advantage, I lost the game and ended up placing 13th.

# Annotated games from the Denker National Tournament of State Middle School Champions by Kal Vanderhoek 



The Barber, Haring, Rockefeller, Denker, and Irwin invitational tournaments kicked off with an opening ceremony, and Dewain Barber's somewhat boastful and humorous personality was in the spotlight. As an example, during the photo session, Mr. Barber singled out one participant and said, "turn around your medal so that it shows my name to the camera." Mostly though, the opening ceremony was rather boring with not much to mention. Let's get on to the tournament.

In Round 1, I played against John McGrath of South Dakota. The game went smoothly, as he was one of the lower rated players in the event. He was very friendly and told me how he got into the Barber tournament. Apparently, the elementary school, middle school, and high school state champions of South Dakota are all siblings. They would have gone to these invitationals, but they could not play on Sundays. John told me that their (the champions') father is an International Master and one of the strongest players in South Dakota. Since the McGrath's were already going to the U.S. open tournament, held at the same time as the invitationals, John was asked if he wanted to play in the Barber tournament two weeks prior to the start date. What a
surprise!

Barber's somewhat boastful and humorous personality was in the spotlight. As an example, during the photo session, Mr. Barber singled out one participant and said, "turn around your medal so that it shows my name to the camera." Mostly though, the opening ceremony was rather boring with not much to mention. Let's get on to the tournament.

In Round 2, I was up against Rohan Padhye (pictured right), the state champion of Ohio. On multiple occasions, I have seen Rohan at Michigan
 chess tournaments. This was a close game, but with only a couple minutes on my clock, I blew the game. Afterwards we exchanged a few thoughts about the game, trying to figure out which assessment was correct. But of course, the engine disagreed and showed multiple ways I could have drawn the game, although not without difficulty. Rohan went on to place fifth in the event, an outstanding achievement considering that he played higher rated opponents four times out of six games.

Round 3 was a disaster. Tired after the four-hour game earlier that day, and a bit dejected to be playing against a London System, I made a terrible blunder, which lost to a stunning bishop and knight sacrifice. When my opponent saw the sacrifice, a penetrating stare appeared on his face, and I wondered what it was that he saw. The move hit me, and my heart sank. Later, I complimented his move, but he told me he didn't fully calculate and assumed it to be at least a draw! That is some brilliant intuition.

Coming into Round 4 the next morning, I had cleared my mind of the losses suffered the day before. With 1 win and 2 losses thus far, I was paired against 1313 rated Dylan Jiang of New Hampshire. I won a piece early on and converted the game with ease. This was my quickest game of the event, but there was still not enough time in between rounds to explore Joshua Tree National Park, an interesting and beautiful park filled with Joshua trees (pictured right) and odd rock formations, as well as great views and much more. I had stopped in the park on the way to the tournament and I was able to take a short stop at one of the park's most elevated points and see the awesome expanse of the desert with Palm Springs and surrounding cities in the valley. Huge mountains, 12,000 feet high, lurked in the haze in the distance. I wish I had been able to visit the park again, as long as it wasn't too hot (it often gets up to $\mathbf{1 2 0}$ degrees there at this time of year).


At the beginning of the 5th Round, I got my board number mixed up and accidentally sat at the wrong board. It was kind of funny when the person who should have been sitting there came to me and thought that he was sitting at the wrong board. However, I quickly realized my mistake and I moved to the correct board, and I sat down opposite Matteo Runge from Louisiana. Before the tournament, everyone was told they could bring a little trinket from their state to give to each of their opponents just before each round. In this round, I received a fancy pen with a keychain on it, and, in this round, my pen ran out of ink, so his gift came to the rescue! In the game, I played with speed and confidence, achieving an easily winning knight versus bishop ending. And then I began to play some of the worst chess I have ever played. Missing several opportunities, the position became drawn, and somehow, I managed to actually lose the game.
Obviously, this tournament was not going my way, but in Round 6, I finally got a stroke of luck. After nearly 4 hours of play against Colin Dean of Connecticut, the position was drawn in a king and pawn endgame. However, Colin would have to find an ingenious resource to hold the game. With the clock ticking down from just a few minutes left, Colin succumbed to the pressure and missed the only move that could have drawn the game. So I won!
Meanwhile, on the top board, CM Brewington Hardaway and Vaseegaran Nandhakumar were still battling away. Winner would take first. I checked the position just before I left, and it seemed very unclear. Both players were down to just a few minutes. But they both seemed very relaxed, demonstrating the composure it takes to win the Barber tournament. I left the playing room, excited to find out who would be the winner. One hour later I received the answer. Brewington Hardaway took first with 5.5 / 6, closely followed by undefeated FM Erick Zhao with 5 / 6.
FM Bach Ngo took 3rd on tiebreaks, tied with Vaseegaran Nandhakumar (4th), and Rohan Padhye (5th). Congratulations to them, and to all the state champions who managed to qualify for the tournament. I hope I can come back and play in the Denker tournament of high school state champions someday.

Round 2: This game was arguably my most interesting game of the tournament. I lost a pawn early on but had decent compensation. I managed to secure a dominating position, almost a bind, but I couldn't figure out how to make progress. My opponent played great defense and turned the tables on me because of just one mistake on my part.

Round 6: This game was a decent example of my resourcefulness after blundering. I try to find every last scrap of counterplay that exists, one of the stronger points in my game. The complex middlegame of my bishops versus his knight caused both of us to burn a lot of time, eventually leaving us in an endgame, in which only I was pushing for the win. As I said before, I had a stroke of luck at the end of the game when he missed a key resource.

# The 38th Denker National Tournament of High School Champions

Hi everyone! This is Adhvaith Rajanish and I would like to share my experience and a few of my games at the 2022 Denker Tournament of High School Champions.
This was my first tournament representing Michigan and I was nervous, but excited to play some good chess. After a long flight to California, we had a formal opening ceremony where we learned about the founders of the Denker, Barber, and Haring tournaments that were going on simultaneously. It was really inspiring to learn about how much each of them contributed to chess. A few hours later I got ready to play round one at 7 PM, which was at 10 PM Michigan time. I was a little tired, but more eager to play. My first round was against a lower rated player, but I didn't take him lightly because I knew that each player earned the right to represent their state. Let's start the game.

[This is a strong move which isn't giving White a crushing attack, but if you aren't prepared like my opponent, Black's position can go out of hand with a few inaccurate moves.] 8...Nc6 9.g5 Nd7? 10.Bxe6!! I ended the tournament with $4 / 6$ and came $12^{\text {th }}$ place on tiebreaks. It was an honor to represent Michigan and playing the tournament was a fun experience. I hope you enjoyed my analysis!

## Annotated games from the National Tournament of Senior State Champions

By Ariel Levi


For the second consecutive year, I was the Michigan representative at the John T. Irwin National Tournament of Senior State Champions, which was held in Palm Springs, CA, July 30 - August 2, 2022. Palm Springs has the reputation of being a great place for a vacation, but not in summer. Outside temperatures were between 102 and 107 during the tournament.

I ended up with a score of $3 / 6$, the same as last year. However, whereas two of my losses last year were against IMs, this year two of my losses were against GMs-Enrico Sevillano and Sergei Kudrin. When the tournament ended, IM Douglas Root and GM Sevillano were tied at the top with $5 / 6$ points. Root took first place on tiebreaks.

This was my third-round game. In a Maroczy Bind position, Kudrin played an aggressive move aimed at setting up a pin and winning a knight. In the subsequent complications, I missed the opportunity to give up my queen for excellent material and positional compensation. A few moves later, I faced the choice between a line that gave me three pawns for a knight versus a line that would have given me a rook and two pawns for two minor pieces. I chose the former. Later analysis by Stockfish 14 revealed that I had misevaluated these lines and had chosen the wrong one. Kudrin won by advancing on the kingside and taking advantage of a time-pressured blunder on my part.

Nxe6, but rejected it on general grounds ("I've calculated two lines that would give me a reasonable position and there is no need to resort to sacrificing the queen for what looks like insufficient compensation."). It turns out that the sacrifice would have been well worth it, yielding sufficient material for the queen as well as a position in which White's great piece activity and coordination make it easier for White than Black to play. According to Stockfish, after 20. Nxe6, Black has no good square for his $f 8$ Rook, and must play 20... Nf5, with the further 21. b3, Qe8; 22. Nxf8, Bxf8; 23. b4, Rc8, giving White at least a slight advantage.] 19...exd4 [If 19.... cd, 20. Ncd6 would give White a big advantage.] 20.Ncd6 Nc8 [I had expected this move but also had to be prepared for 20....Rb6, the other attempt to win a piece. I had planned to play 21. Rxc5, Rxd6; 22. Rc7, Qe8 (necessary to keep the b5 knight pinned); 23. Rxa7, Rb6; 24 b4, Bd7; 25. Nc7 Bxa4; 26. Nxe8 with three pawns for the piece. I couldn't calculate beyond this point but thought that my two passed pawns, active rooks, and strong light-squared bishop would give me reasonable chances. After 20...Nc8, I faced the critical choice. I spent about 15 minutes deciding between 21. Rxc5, which would give me three pawns for my knight, and 21. Nb7, which would give me a rook and two pawns for my knight and bishop. It was a close call, but I chose 21. Rxc5, mainly because I didn't want to give up my light-squared bishop and allow a potential king-side attack: 21. Nb7, Rxb7; 22. Bxb7, Qxb7; 23. Rxc5, Bh3. However, subsequent analysis with Stockfish shows that I made the wrong choice. After 23.... Bh3, White can play 24. Qc4+, Kh8; 25. Qd5, Qe7; 26. Rc2, with advantage to White. In contrast, the line I chose was evaluated by Stockfish as giving Black an advantage equivalent to about 1.5 pawns.] 21.Rxc5? Nxd6 22.Bc6 Qe7 23.Nxd4 Bf7 24.Rc2 f5 25.Bf3 Qf6 [Here, I thought my position was fine. I had three pawns for the piece, a safe king, and active pieces. However, Black gains the initiative by advancing on the kingside. ] $26 . e 3 \mathrm{~g} 5$ [Stockfish gives the variation $26 \ldots . . f 427 \mathrm{gf}, \mathrm{Nf5}$; 28. Following is my fifth-round game. I obtained an advantageous middle game, then let my advantage dissipate after an attempt at tactical trickery fell short. The game looked like it was heading toward a draw when my opponent made a horrific blunder and had to resign.

White will be able to attack it with d3 and e4, and the natural move 9....Nbd2 would block the bishop's retreat along its original diagonal. [This was my idea - a double attack on Black's loose bishop and knight that would lead to a forced win of material. However, later analysis with Stockfish showed that for the sacrifice to work it was necessary to first trade rooks on e8: 24. Rxe8, Rxe8; 25. Ne3, Ne4; 26. Qc2, Bf5; 27 g4, Nxf2; 28. Nxf5+, gf; 29. I rejected the trade of rooks on the principle that one should not give up a central file to the opponent unless necessary. Unfortunately, the version I chose, with an immediate 24. Ne3, dissipated much of my advantage ] 24...Ne4 25.Qc2 Bf5 [During my long think before the pawn sacrifice, I had planned to play 26. g4 to win a piece (which would be the case if I had included a prior trade of rooks, as in the variation above). However, here I realized that this move now fails to $26 \ldots . . \mathrm{Qf4}$. If then 27 . gf, Rd2 wins. If $27 . \mathrm{f} 3, \mathrm{Nd} 2 \mathrm{wins}$. And if 27 . $\mathrm{Nxf5}+\mathrm{gf}$, and Black is a pawn up with advantage. After $26 \ldots$... $q 4$, the best that White can do is play 27. Rbd1, after which $27 \ldots . . . \mathrm{Rxd} 1 ; 28$. Rxd1, Bc8; 29. Rd4, f 5 with advantage to Black. So with $m y$ time running low, I had to settle for a tiny advantage.] 26.Nxf5+ gxf5 27.Bxe4 fxe4 28.Rxe4 Rxe4 29.Qxe4 Qe5 [29.... Rd5 was slightly better. My only hope to win this game was to keep the queens on and try to take advantage of Black's slightly weakened kingside. But the game should be a draw.] 30.Qb4 Rd7?? [Truelson played this with more than 20 minutes on his clock, compared to my 4 minutes. I believe that he was hoping that I would play 31. Re1, after which he would play 31.... a5, "forcing" me to play 32. Rxe5, after which 32.... ab; 33. Ra5, Rd3; 34. ab, Rxb3; 35. Ra4 would give Black a more active rook with the possibility of getting a passed pawn on the queenside.] 31.Qg4+ [Truelson resigned immediately.] 1-0

This month, we will look at some upsets from the 2022 Michigan Open. First, let's start with the kind of player that Dave Moody used to refer to as the "miracle A-player". Kalman Vanderhoek had superlative tournament, beating two A-players, an expert, and a veteran master enroute to a $4.5 / 7$ score and 71 rating points! Here is his round 4 game against MI master Kevin Noren.

Noren,Kevin (2210) - Vanderhoek, Kalman (1903) [B52] Sicilian Defense: Moscow Variation 2022 Mi Open - Open Section Lansing (4), 04.09.2022

1. e4 c5 2. Nf3 d6 3. Bb5+ [A popular antiSicilian line, the Rossolimo or Canal Attack affords White a simple plan of exchanging off his white-square bishop, then trying to get a grip on d5. Black has three main options here: 3. . . Nd7; 3. . . Nc6; and 3. . . Bd7. If 3. . Nd7, then Black intends to keep his bishop pair, enduring some internal tangle. The move 3. . . Nc6 is playable, but it invites structural damage after a subsequent Bxc6. Black opts for the most common interposition.] Bd7 [Many moves have been tried here to delay the trade, but none offer White much: 4. a4 Nf6 5. Bxd7+ Qxd7 6. d3 Nc6 7. O-O e6 8. Na3 Be7 is equal; 4. c4 Nc6 5. Nc3 e5 6. d3 Be7 7. O-O is a mutual queenside stonewall with equal play.] 4. Bxd7+ Qxd7 [Black intends for his QN to go the more active c6 square. Having deliberately traded his KB, White usually pursues some kind of white-square strategy. However, the most popular move at this point is to wait with $5.0-0$ and see what kind of structure black commits to defending - one based on a small-center with e7-e6 or a fianchetto with $\mathrm{g} 6-\mathrm{g} 7$. White chooses to immediately grip d5.] 5. c4 g6 Black commits to play on the long black diagonal. Larsen Suboticanec, Zagreb, 1955 continued violently with 5. . . e5 6. O-O g6 7. Nc3 Bh6 8. Nd5 Nc6
2. a3 Nce7 10. b4 Nxd5 11. cxd5 cxb4 12. d4 f6 13. dxe5 fxe5 14. axb4 Bxc1 15. Rxc1 Nf6 16. Ng5 O-O 17. f4 Ng4 18. Qe2 exf4 19. Ne6 Ne5 20. Rc7 Qa4 21. Qf2 Qxb4 22. Rg7+ Kh8 23. Qh4 h5 24. Qg5 Ng4? 25. Rh7+!! 1-0. In this game, White aims for a Maroczy-type structure.] 6. d4 cxd4 7. Nxd4 Nf6 8. Nc3 Bg7 9. O-O Nc6 10. Nde2 O-O [Here, Black could have applied more pressure to the white center with 10 . . Qe6 leading to a wild position after 11. Nd5! Qxe4 12. Nc7+ Kd7 13. Nxa8 Qxc4 14. Bd2 Rxa8] 11. f3 [Now White's center is stable, and he can settle into exploiting his central space and d5. Black does not intend to defend passively though.] Rfd8 12. Bg5 Ne8?! [Black should put the question to the bishop with 12. . . h6 so that e6 could be played without the Nf6 being pinned.] 13. Qd2 Nc7 14. Rfd1 [A major strategic decision for White is where to put his rooks. If the overall idea is to get a knight to d 5 , then if there is an exchange, White will actually want to capture away from the center with exd5 and put pressure on the Black e-pawn. For that reason, it might have been better to wait with 14 . b3 and follow with Rad1 and Rfe1 later.] Ne6 15. Be3 Ne5 16. b3 Nc5?? [This hangs a piece due to the pin on the d-file. With 17. f4! Ned3 15. b4!, Black's knights are disconnected. If 15... Nxb4 then 16. Bxc5 wins.] 17. Rab1?? [A bad miss for White, but it's a common malady to overlook tactics when pursuing a positional theme.] Qc6 18. Nd5 Rd7 19. Qc2?! [White has a small plus, and now was the time to reapply pressure to e7 with 19. Bg5.] e6 20. Ndc3 b6 21. h3 [With a view to trapping the Ne5 with f 4 and not allowing Ng4.] f5? [This compromises Black's kingside, puts the e6 and d6 pawns in a pincer on half-open files, and forces the Ne 5 to a passive square. Much better was 21. . . Qc8.] 22. Nd4?! [Better was 22. f4 forcing 22. . . Nf7. Then after 23. Nd4 Bxd4 24. Rxd4 White has increased his advantage.] Qb7 23. exf5 gxf5 24. Rd2 [24. b4!, driving the Nc5 back.] Re8 25. Re1 Bf8 26. Rdd1 Ng6? [Exposing his center to attack.] 27. b4 [The immediate retreat Bc 1 or advance Bg 5 were much better, as there are tactics against the pinned e6 pawn.] Na6 28. Qb3 [28. Bf2! targeting e6 and f5 was better. If 28. . . Nxb4 then both 29. Qa4 a5 30. Nxf5 and 29. Qb1 Nc6 30. Rxe6 are winning.] Nc7 29. Bf2 [Better to gain space with 29. a4. What follows now are a flurry of inaccurate moves, possibly time pressure.] Rg7 [Very optimistic, but 29. . Rf7 was much better.] 30. Nde2? [After this, White's advantage evaporates. Necessary was the fearless 30 . Bg3! keeping the Ng6 locked up. If then $30 \ldots \mathrm{f} 4$ ? 31 . Bf 2 Ne 5 white is again winning as he has e4 for his knight.] Ne5 31. Kf1 Nxf3? [Engines do not like this move, but it is a very Tal-like sacrifice! The resulting positions are not something pleasant to defend in time-trouble.] 32. gxf3 Qxf3 33. Ng1? [It was time to ditch the h-pawn and secure a path to the queenside with 33. Nd4!] Qg2+ 34. Ke2 Rg3! [An excellent move, cutting off the
king's escape.] 35. Qc2 d5?! [Black had the shocking $35 \ldots$ Nd5!, where any capture opens the e-file with check.] 36. Rd3 f4! [An incredible resource that keeps the attack going, for if 37 . Rxg3 fxg3 38. Rf1 Bxb4 wins.] 37. Rf3 Bxb4 38. Qd3 dxc4 39. Qxc4?? [Should be a fatal mistake as now the knight joins the fight. White had to play 39. Qe4 to hold the center.] Nd5 40. Rc1 Nxc3+?! [Black is still much better after this premature cashing of his chips, but now was the time to regroup with 41. . . Rg5!. For example, . . . Rg5 41. Ne4 Re5 42. Qd4 Bc3! 43. Qd3 Rd8 is winning.] 41. Rexc3 Bxc3 42. Qxc3 Rg5? [Now, it's too late. Black needed to play 42. .. Rxf3 when White has to keep the queens on and avoid the endgame with 43. Nxf3. Now, White has good drawing chances.] 43. Rxf4 Rc5 [43. . . Qd5!] 44. Qb2?? [Back into the fire after climbing out! The lineup of K and Q on the 2 nd rank is unfortunate, and black pounces.] Rec8 45. Qd4 Rc2+ 46. Ke1 Rc1+ 47. Kd2 R8c2+?? [Throwing away the win with $47 \ldots$ R1c2+ 48 . Kd2 Qg5!. For example, 50. Be3 R8c2+ 51. Kd3 Qb5+ 52. Ke4 Qc6+ and white loses major material to stop mate. White is still worse, but for the moment he can exhale.] 48. Ke3 Rc3+ 49. Kd2 R1c2+ 50. Ke1 Rc1+ 51. Kd2 Qg5 [Finally, Black finds the correct idea, but White can still escape immediate mate with 52. Qd6!, but alas...] 52. Ke2?? R3c2+? [Missing a mate in two with 52 . Qb5+53. Kd2 Qb2\#] 53. Kf3 Rxf2+ 54. Qxf2 Rc3+ 55. Ke2 Rc2+?! [Prolonging the fight. 55. . . Qb5+ again and White is in a mating net.] 56. Kf1 Rxf2+ 57. Rxf2 Qb5+ 58. Kg2 a5 59. Nf3 Qc4 60. Kh2 b5 61. Ne5 Qc7 62. Re2 b4 63. Kg1 a4 64. Rg2+ Kf8 65. Re2 b3 66. axb3 67. Ng4 b2 0-1 [A hard-fought battle by both players!]

This year however featured an even better "miracle B-player": Sanjana Ramesh. Rated only 1713, she scored an incredible 5.5/7, gaining 200 rating points with a 2300 performance! Unfortunately, we don't have any of her games. So, in the next issue we'll look at another big "A-player" upset.
