## Determining MCA Invitational <br> Representatives for 2021

Due to COVID restrictions still in place, we were unable to hold the Michigan Junior and Michigan Senior events that we typically have in the Spring. These events determine our representatives for the invitational events held in conjunction with the U.S. Open. The COVID situation was appearing to improve, but not enough to hold full events, so we had to get creative to determine who would be our representatives. A big thanks to MCA board member, Lei (Ray) Wang for putting together our plan. We still wanted to be able to hold the determining event in person but needed to limit the attendance. To allow for greater participation, we held an online qualifier with rating minimums for each grade level (and another for the girls' event).
The top 4 players for each grade level from the online qualifier would meet in person the next week. There were only 4 girls signed up for the qualifier, so the online event was not held since all qualified, but only three players chose to participate in the championship event.
For the Senior event, we did not hold a qualifier, but instead, put a request for players interested in participating in the in-person event and selected the top 4 players that were available.
For the sections that resulted in a tie for the top player, we held a blitz playoff between the tied players. In the Children's section, Jesse Ren defeated Marcus Zhang 1.5-0.5 in the playoff. In the Girls' section, Charisse Woods won 2-0 versus Nurayda Albeez. Bryan Wilson captured video of both blitz playoffs which can be found on the MCA YouTube channel. Just search for Michigan Chess Association or you can find those, and other videos linked to our website, www.michess.org on the left side of the page. In the Junior section, Michael Zheng declined the invitation to play in the Denker Tournament of High School Champions, so Larrance Xing was our representative by finishing second in this event.

This month we see the return of long dormant and over worked Jason Morris. With seemingly renewed vigor for chess, he has put together a set of 6 games for your enjoyment.


Dr. Jason Morris has been playing chess since he was 9 - (Thanks mom for teaching me!). He was and still is a HUGE Fischer "fanboy". His other favorite players are (in no particular order) Ivanchuck, Shirov, Morozevich, and Nakamura. His highest USCF rating was 2120, and has been a rated expert for 30 years - in his own words: "not because I'm stupid, but because I just don't have time to study and play anymore!'"). His best chess result was probably going 5 wins - 1 loss - 0 draws at the 1992 Pan Am College Team Tournament, where the Michigan Technological University team that he captained won clear 2nd place. Currently sporting a 2041 USCF rating, Dr. Morris laments: "Unfortunately, life interferes with me getting any better, but who knows?"

# My Denker Journey

As a chess player who went without playing competitive chess for a few months, the 2021 GM Arnold Denker invitational was both exciting and challenging. On one hand, there's the thrill of playing against great players from around the country; on the other hand, there was the pressure of trying to win matches against tough opponents while I was relatively rusty. Before the start of the first match, each player received the flag of their respective state and a medal carved with the face of GM Arnold Denker. Throughout the matches players would stick their flag next to the chess boards and it was interesting getting to know which states my opponents were representing. In terms of matches, I had a rough ride, as my rating was near the bottom of the roster. I faced one 2200 , one 2100 , one 2000 , two 1900 , and one 900 rated player. For the first 5 matches I won against anyone rated lower than 2000 and lost against anyone rated higher than 2000. In most of my matches I put up a good fight and my losses were generally due to miscalculations in late middle game or end game. In my last match I got scared and thus played extremely carefully, resulting in a draw. Alas, I did not play extraordinarily well or contribute much to the team standings, but I have no regrets regarding the invitational. Overall, the invitational was a spectacular experience and I hope the Michigan representatives to the other invitationals also enjoyed their time in Cherry Hill as much as I did!

## Clarification on how the USCF determines each state's monthly top players.

Inconsistencies resulting from the publication of the Summer issue was raised by a member concerned that the listing of the Top 100 did not reflect the true players in good standing. Because of the scourge of Covid-19, it became virtually impossible for in-person play due to the nearly world-wide fear of infection, thereby resulting in wholesale cancelation of virtually all such chess-related events, tournaments, matches and team play. As a result, the August 2020 USCF rating list reflected participation virtually, drastically limiting opportunities for traditionally very active Michigan players. My usual procedure was to access the USCF website and download and post the names of Michigan's Top 100 available from its system. As a result, players with ratings as low as 1581 appeared on that list mostly due to their participation in online activity, which significantly negatively skewed the list.

My contact with USCF Executive Director Carol Meyer was delegated to Boyd Reed, USCF Events Director, and his explanation is detailed below:

- Mr. Rutkofske - your email was forwarded to me by the Executive Director. My apologies for our previous failure to promptly answer your inquiry. That is certainly not intentional. Everyone in the Events Department is wearing a lot of hats these days, particularly Mr. Kormick. Despite our best efforts, an email may occasionally go unanswered, especially if the answer isn't immediately clear. As members of staff, my colleagues in the Events Department and I are not privy to Board discussions, though we strive to rapidly implement any instructions from them.
- To the best of my knowledge, the criteria for computing state OTB rankings is still as it was prior to the pandemic, which means the 12-month inactivity threshold would still be in effect. No one on our staff has the authority to alter those requirements. That can only be accomplished through a directive from the Executive Board, in the form of a motion passed by formal vote. The Board did pass a motion earlier this year, suspending the inactivity threshold for invitational event rating lists and national top-100 lists. However, that motion did not extend to state rankings, so it wasn't implemented there.
- A copy of this email will be sent to the Executive Director. As an ex officio member of the Board, and the chief executive of the Federation, any concerns my colleagues and I have that might warrant Board consideration are properly communicated through her.

At this point, rather than delay the issue, my task will be to unravel and reconstruct the MI Top 100 list that was in effect from the Spring 2020 list. Hopefully, the Winter issue of Michigan Chess will feature a more accurate list.- Lon Rutkofske, editor
